



An Introduction to Children's Literature

Throughout the world, there is evidence of storytelling in just about every culture. Before written language, stories were used to pass down ideas and historical knowledge. Not all of the stories were for the entertainment of children, but some were.

With the advent of the printing press and the publication of books starting in the 1400s, books for adults began to be available for wider and wider usage, among these books was the Bible. While the Bible was often used as a text for teaching children to read, it was not changed in any way for its use with children. In the English-speaking world, books for children first became available in the late 1700s, first appearing in England published by John Newbery. Newbery believed in hard work being rewarded and his books reflected this philosophy, didactically telling children how to behave.

Fast forward to the twentieth century in the US and we can see the evolution from didactic books, still largely in place in the mid-century to the end of the twentieth century. Books for children in the 1950s had other common trends as well. Most children's books showed only white children in middle class settings and the children had no real-world problems, no families of divorce, no disabilities, no illnesses, etc. Gradually over the last five decades of the 1900s and into the 2000s, books for children began to represent the world we live in more realistically. Girls came to be more equally represented in books and BIPOC gained a higher level of representation, although we still find discrepancies between the representation of a population in our country and the representation of that population in children's literature. Children's books now tackle a myriad of issues from obesity to physical and cognitive disabilities to families with two mothers or fathers.

The books chosen for our summer series show children all around the world, with a fair representa-



tion of gender, ethnicities and cultures. This is true for the characters of the books chosen as well as for the authors. Although publishers of children's literature, still largely the domain of white men, have opened up publication to more and more literature representing the world as it currently exists, there is still a long way to go. By sharing

EVALUATING CHILDREN'S LITERATURE

Children's literature can be examined or evaluated using the same criteria we use for any literature by looking at the plot, character development, theme, setting and literary devices. We combine this with an evaluation of the pictures if we are talking about picture books.



Plot: does the sto-

ry move along smoothly? Is there a rising plot structure, with a climax and a denouement? If the story is a realistic story (not fantasy), is the plot believable?

- Character Development: Are the characters more than two dimensional? Because a picture book is necessarily short, there may be only one or two developed characters in each book. Do the main characters act in consistent ways, or if their behavior changes, is it believable?
- Theme: What is the main idea the story is trying to convey? Is the theme told in a way that makes the reader think, or is it very direct? Is there a lesson in the book?
- Setting: How is the setting represented? This could include the actual location, for example a city or town in a specific place, as well as the home or school represented. Children's books often have somewhat nebulous settings, so it is good to examine what the author and illustrator are trying to convey. Is it a largely middle-class representation of life, or does the setting convey other backgrounds or particular ethnicities?
- Literary devices: This can encompass many things such as the use of rhyme, alliteration, onomatopoeia, metaphor and simile, excellent word choice, etc. Does the text read smoothly when

read aloud? Are there both short and long sentences, giving it a balance and making it easier to read aloud?

Pictures in a picture book are like any other piece of art and they have aesthetic value in most cases according to the viewer. However, in a picture book, we can also ask the question: Do these pictures enhance

the story that is being told? Do the pictures work with the text to tell a cohesive story?

For the purposes of using these books in conjunction with Biblical teaching, we also may want to look at the books from a sociocultural or a more critical perspective. In this case, we may want to evaluate the books by looking at the following:

• What races are represented in the book(s)? Are there only white people or only black people? Are Asians or Native/Indigenous people represented? If more than one race is represented, is one race dominant? Do the characters show stereotypical or racist behaviors?


• What about gender? Overall, do the stories focus more on boys than on girls, or vice/versa? Are nonbinary children/adults represented at all? Look closely at both the text and the pictures to see how genders are represented. Do the boys and girls behave in "traditional" fashion? For example, do the girls wear skirts or dresses, even when playing outdoors? Are the boys told not to cry? Are the boys more adventurous than the girls? Are they shown doing gendered chores, such as girls cooking and boys mowing the lawn? What about the parents? Is the mother subservient to the father, even in little ways?

ChurchWorks

Session Highlights from the Stated Session Meeting on April 20, 2021

We approved the following updated policy related COVID. Please see the weekly email for a link to a document with further explanations and details behind the reasoning for the updates.

The following policies apply to all church activities except Preschool which will be governed by the Govans Presbyterian Preschool Parent Handbook Addendum for COVID-19.



- Everyone in the church buildings must wear a mask at all times and maintain social distancing. Exception: Children under two years old should be encouraged to wear a mask but are not required.
- No food or drink may be consumed on the church grounds. Individuals such as staff or students may still eat (lunch breaks, etc), but any group including church or rentals may not eat or drink.
- All rooms must be cleaned, sanitized and if possible ventilated by church staff after each use by a group and before being used by another group.
- All rooms must be cleaned and sanitized daily if used.
- Rentals may resume on a case by case basis effective June 1st pending approval from the Building Use and Rental Approval Team.
- Soul Kitchen will continue to serve take out meals only until sit-down meals are approved by the Session.
- Attendance restrictions for in-person worship will follow this schedule:
- Effective April 25th we will begin an online sign up process to allow individuals to attend in-person worship. Sign-up priority will be given to worship leaders. Following the current policy 12 people are allowed in the Sanctuary during worship.
- Beginning Sunday, June 13th a total of 20 people will be allowed in the Sanctuary during Sunday worship.
- Beginning Sunday, July 11th a total of 30 people will be allowed in the Sanctuary during Sunday worship.
- Beginning Sunday, August 8th a total of 40 people will be allowed in the Sanctuary during Sunday worship.
- Beginning September 12th a total of 60 people will be allowed in the Sanctuary during worship.
- During the transition to more people worshipping in the sanctuary, every other pew will be roped off. One worship leader at a time may remove their mask. In lieu of congregational singing, vocal music will be sung by the music teams. All singers must be masked.
- In-person Sunday School and Adult Options may resume September 12th, 2021.
- Outdoor activities are permitted provided masks are worn.

In other business,

- We approved a working document to help us get the committee structure organized and formalized at Govans. We will be making an effort to have officers for each committee and rotating membership.
- We approved a recommendation from Facilities to contract with SecureAlarms to install surveillance cameras in every Preschool Classroom, on the playground, and in the church kitchen. These will help the Director supervise the classrooms, and provide security for teachers and students.
- We approved the design for the AV upgrades for the Sanctuary and approved staff to begin obtaining bids. The design includes:
- Flat screen video monitors next to the pulpit and the lectern facing the congregation (as presented to the congregation during the feedback sessions).
- There will also be a monitor next to the organ console facing the choir loft so the choir can see the screens.
- The system will give us the ability to broadcast our services live on Zoom once we return to in-person worship. We will also be able to have participants join us remotely to lead worship such as Minute for Missions, Announcements, Lay Leadership, etc.

MAY MISSION OFFERING - CEDEPCA

Imagine being a young girl in Guatemala, a country where violence against women is a serious problem. Imagine going to a day-long workshop where you hear for the first time that girls, like boys, are created in God's image. Imagine learning that you deserve to be treated with respect and kindness. These are the messages conveyed in the Tamar Project, named for the biblical daughter of King David. In this workshop "It's Marvelous to be a Woman", girls in Guatemala may learn for the first time that they are valued as much as boys.







CEDEPCA, our mission partner with The Presbytery of Baltimore, has provided these workshops in recent years. It is but one project of CEDEPCA, (which in English stands for the Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America). CEDEPCA is an ecumenical educational organization based in Guatemala that works to transform lives in Central America. Our Presbytery has had a partnership with CEDEPCA since 2015.

CEDEPCA has four different ministry focuses: A Biblical and Theological Seminary, Women's Ministry, Disaster Ministry and Intercultural Encounters.

Biblical and Theological Seminary: CEDEPCA offers flexible and accessible programs of formal theological education, preparing Christians for leadership, for practice in transforming theology and for engagement in pastoral work that incorporates issues of gender, interculturalism and the environment.

Women's Ministry: CEDEPCA is committed to empowering women to understand and assert their rights, to learn to care for themselves and to assume leadership in their communities.

Disaster Ministry: Guatemala is vulnerable to various natural disasters. CEDEPCA teaches preparation to reduce the impact of disaster, and their

teams respond with material, psychosocial and spiritual support. They were very active during the recent stage 5 hurricanes.

Intercultural Encounters: This program designs and facilitates visitors' experiences of encounter, reflection and dialogue with the local Guatemalan community. Covid has put a hold on this program at present. In the past we have visited and learned about each other. We hope to restart these encounters as the pandemic recedes Visits are aimed at strengthening our partnership.



Guatemala is a beautiful country and the Guatemalan people have so much to share. CEDEPCA is the Govans mission focus for this month of May. Please consider earmarking a contribution for CEDEPCA.



• *Multiculturalism:* Many books are written today to show the pluralistic world we live in. But do they represent cultures other than white America in a positive way? How does the narrator talk about cultures that are different from middle class America? Is there respect shown? How stereotypical are the representations? Are people of color shown always living in poverty? Are people in African and Asian countries shown always wearing traditional clothing?

• Who is telling the story? You can examine both the narrator of the story and the author. Is the narrator telling his/her own story or is the narrator someone outside of the story? It often seems that a BIPOC is not allowed to tell his/her own story. Does the author come from the race/gender that is



represented in the story? This does not mean that a person from one race or gender can never tell a story that is written about another race or gender, but it is often a red flag if the person is writing outside of his/her own identity. Does the voice feel authentic?

• What is the moral or the lesson of the story? Is this lesson given in a very didactic way? Does the narrator or the author tell the child/reader what to think? Is the voice condescending to the child? Or does the voice allow the children /readers to think for themselves? Does the author trust the children to make good decisions and to figure out the meaning of the story without putting it too bluntly or in-your-face?

In looking briefly at the books that have been chosen by Billy, there appears to be a mix of genders and ethnicities represented both in the characters as well as in the authors. As we read these books to the congregation throughout the summer, we may want to emphasize the ways the children in the books are acting outside of ste-

Dear Friends,

We are sending our greetings to you in the precious name of Jesus Christ the Savior and Redeemer of all. May the peace of the Eternal God be with you all.

We are happy to be able to give you an update on the situation in Haiti. As you may see it on the news, the violence in Haiti continues to worsen in Port-au-Prince and in several principal cities. these wonderful children's books, we hope to encourage everyone to look outside the box when purchasing books for children in your family and in your community. For example, Charlotte's Web is an amazing book for children that continues to be beloved by almost all who read it, but is it the best book to represent the child and community we are trying to nurture?

We can find examples of Biblical principles in many places, but perhaps children's literature is one of the easiest places to look. Again, the books we will explore this summer carry many lessons for both children and adults. In some cases, they mirror the parables of Jesus and in others, they simply and directly tell us how we should behave. As we explore these books together, we can revisit the importance of story to our lives, no matter how old we are.•

SUPPORTING GOVANS THROUGH TAX-ADVANTAGED GIVING

Good news for Senior Citizens! If you are at least 72 years old and must make a Required Minimum Distribution from your tax-deferred IRA accounts, you may be able to take advantage of another provision of the Congressionally-approved SECURE Act. A Qualified Charitable Distribution is a direct transfer of assets from an IRA to Govans, which can provide you with additional benefits.

First, if made properly the amount will be treated as a reduction of your Required Minimum Distribution, up to total contributions in a year of \$100,000. The effect would be to reduce your ordinary income, which could decrease income taxes. It could also reduce income-based surcharges on such things as Medicare Parts B and D.

Second, if you use the standard deduction to calculate your taxes, and are unable to itemize charitable contributions, using Qualified Charitable Distributions can give you the ability to get some benefit from such contributions. For example, it is a great way to cover your annual pledge to Govans.

Other options to contribute to Govans continue to include legacy gifts from your estate or trust. Of course, you may make regular cash donations, or of appreciated securities. Often these are matched by employers, so please check that possibility. There may be different, but significant, tax advantages to these methods. This may seem complicated, and, admittedly, these paragraphs do not provide everythingyou need to know. Therefore, it is important to consult your tax advisor, financial consultant or IRA custodian for complete details about making a Qualified Charitable Distribution transfer.



COUNCIL AT JERUSALEM -Acts 15: 1-18


Verse for the week: "On the contrary, we believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, just as they will." Acts 15:11


