

The <u>US Mint</u> announced that quarters featuring civil rights leader, poet laureate, college professor, and Broadway actress Maya Angelou were distributed in the US beginning January 10, 2022. Angelou, who died in 2014, is the first Black female to be depicted on a quarter.

The author draws on her Ojibwe heritage to explain the connection between people, land, and water and to highlight our responsibility to protect all forms of life around us. Drawing inspiration from the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe's protest of the Dakota Access Pipeline, the book is a call to action for environmental justice and an artistic story about culture, traditions, and activism.


I Have a Dream


Written by Elizabeth Kennedy and illustrated by Kadir Nelson


