#### PASTORAL PONDERINGS

Dear Friends.

For some people, this holiday season may be feeling a little more "normal" than the same time last year. Others are still feeling cautious. Vaccination status certainly changes the benefit/risk formula, so many have been



incessantly calculating in their heads and hearts since March 2020. Some have little ones at home who cannot be vaccinated or whose immune system still isn't strong enough to protect them.

One thing this pandemic has taught us is that everyone is different. We see the world differently. We experience risk differently. We evaluate risk differently. We react to change and restrictions differently. Yet, given the communal nature of this disease, we are still all in it together. In other words, we have been forced to check our assumptions about our sameness, while learning how much we depend on one another for our common well being.

I am reminded of the words of the Apostle Paul from Philippians, "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form."

Christmas is the time when we are reminded of the human form of I God. We are reminded that Christ shows us the way to set aside our I assumptions and our arrogance, and instead, serve one another; listen I to each other; seek to understand people who experience the world I through different eyes, and in a different body.

We are not the same. Yet, if we follow Christ's example to humbly listen to one another and serve one another, we can be one.


#### **PUBLIC STATEMENT ON GOVANS'RACIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY**

In the spirit of Christ, Govans Presbyterian Church strives to be an antiracist church. We practice the love of Jesus in a relational ministry, and we fight for equality and equal opportunity for all people.



#### **Definitions:**

- •Racism includes both prejudicial acts from people from one race to another (individual racism), but also includes ideologies within systems of power (systemic racism).<sup>1</sup>
- •Antiracism actively works against individual and systemic racism. 23
- •While individuals can and do perform racist acts, systemic racism is more insidious and dangerous to Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC).
- •We recognize that racism is a sin, endemic within our country and the body of the Christian church. This sin of racism causes a division between the races and marginalizes a significant portion of our population, resulting in severe and ongoing inequality between the races in education, wealth, health, income, and opportunity.<sup>4</sup>



Why must we become an anti-racist church? We answer this question guided by perspectives of Theological and Presbyterian faith traditions.

- Three basic tenets of the Christian faith:
  - 1.All people are created in the image of God.
  - 2. Jesus told us to do unto others as we would like them to do to us, but racist behavior does to others what we would hate done to us.
  - 3.Jesus said, too, to love our neighbors, but racist structures inhibit the practice of love in communities.<sup>5</sup>
- •From the Presbyterian Church Anti-racism/Racial Justice Policy Statement: "Our identity [as Christians] compels us to oppose the forces of injustice. Antiracism, therefore, is prescriptive for what a faithful community must do in the quest to let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. The church must actively oppose the forces of racism in concrete and strategic ways."
- •"We know that all people are sacred and worthy. We are made equal by God, who created humanity in God's own image. Out of our deep love of God and neighbor, when we see people being treated as less than equal we will speak out."6
- •In 1999, the 211th General Assembly declared that we will "assume an antiracist identity, provide adequate staffing and funding for implementation of the church-wide strategy for antiracism...and urge governing bodies and congregations to assume an antiracism identity,

[making] available to the church training resources, which are essential for the implementation of the church-wide strategy." (1999 Statement PCUSA). We grieve that these statements and initiatives from our denomination and church have not resulted in sustained action, we conclude that now is the time to act rather than analyze and in a spirit of repentance Govans Presbyterian Church seeks to become an antiracist church.

#### Particular Actions our church is taking to make Govans Presbyterian Church an anti-racist church:

- •Showing the level of commitment in a financial and practical way, the Session established Racial Justice as a dedicated ministry of the church and Committee of Session (not simply a program); this ministry is financially supported by hiring a Minister of Racial Justice (January 2021).
- •We formed a Racial Justice Ministry Working Group which includes church members as well as members from broader community
- •We are educating ourselves and offering opportunities to the congregation and community to join in this education. (Book Groups, Racial Justice Speakers Series)
- •We are engaging with the community around racial issues (Storytelling, Movie Nights, Open Space Conversations).
- •We are currently forming antiracist policies on hiring, contracting and other employment issues, to become anti-racist and to encourage BIPOC to apply for open positions at any level within our church organization.
- •We are in contact with other denominations and other PCUSA congregations that have taken on the difficult, ongoing work of pursuing racial justice to learn from their triumphs and mistakes
- •We are interviewing older Govans and former Brown Memorial parishioners to learn from our past mistakes and successes within living memory, and the effects of policies and pastors from our past on the Govans' neighborhood
- •We are preparing a short questionnaire to assess church members who are not formally interviewed to learn their perspectives on racial justice, our church history and more
- •We will be using Adult Options and other church forums to explain the history of Govans' involvement in fighting for (and impeding) civil rights, so we can learn how to proceed, especially within the Presbytery's Matthew 25 initiative.

The Session met for our regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 16th. We had a full agenda and wanted to share some highlights.

We reviewed the first draft of a budget for 2022. We won't be able to make any meaningful decisions about the budget until the 2022 pledges are in. So if you have not sent in your pledge please do so online at govanspres.org/pledge, or place your pledge card in the offering plate, or mail it to the church office. Blank pledge cards are available in the back of the church.

We are moving into the second year of our new staffing initiative, we are giving the Presbytery recommended 4% COLA increase in 2022, and we have new expenses as we commit to continue a live interactive broadcast of Sunday Worship services. So every dollar of support makes a difference.

We approved a re-organization of the church office staff. Pam Wallace will be decreasing her hours and focusing only on the financial duties, while Andy Wilson will become the full time Office Manager taking over Facilities management and Human Resources duties. Both Andy and Pam participated in planning the re-organization and are looking forward to the change at the beginning of 2022.

We approved a request from the Facilities Committee to hire an Owner Representative to guide us in a major needed renovation of the East and South facing window walls of the Preschool building. We hope this will help us keep costs down for what will be a complex project.

The Second Service Music Director Search Committee is working hard on developing an updated job description to begin a search as soon as possible. The Session granted them a budget to include advertising, possible travel costs for candidates, and funding to meet with a consultant to help write a job description that clearly articulates our needs.

Finally, we considered two proposals from the Racial Justice Working Group. The first proposal was a public statement about our racial justice ministry. The document defines what we mean by anti-racism and racial justice, explains why these issues are so important to us as a church, and defines the actions we are taking as a result. You can read the on pages 6 and 7 and you will soon be able to find it on the church website.

We also discussed a policy document defining anti-racist hiring practices we will commit to in the future. After considerable discussion, this document was referred back to the Racial Justice Ministry Working Group for clarification and possible revision.

Finally, we established a merit-based raise system for the staff of Govans Presbyterian Church. Every two years, each staff member will be eligible for 0-3% merit based raises. The Personnel Committee and Pastor Tom will recommend the raises to Session. These raises will be in addition to any COLA increases which attempt to provide every year based on Presbytery recommendations. This will allow us to be transparent with staff regarding what to expect in regard to raises.


27,000

## CHRISTMAS FOR THOSE DEALING WITH HOMELESSNESS - WARM HATS AND SOCKS

#### **GOVANS CHOIR PRESENT'S VIVALDI'S "GLORIA"-DECEMBER 12**

Antonio Vivaldi, (1678-1741) was a gifted and prolific composer of the Baroque Era and a contemporary of Bach and Handel. He lived in Venice where he was both an ordained priest as well as the Master of Concerts and teacher of violin at the "Oespedale della Pieta." This school was an orphanage for poor and orphaned girls in the city. Vivaldi taught his students to play string instruments in order to raise money for the orphanage and also, to train his female students to be better candidates for marriage. The "red-haired priest" conducted concerts of memorable beauty with an all female orchestra!

Although Vivaldi is best known for his instrumental works, his vocal works are also exciting and well-loved. The Govans Chancel Choir will perform the "Gloria" on December 12 at the 11:00 am service, and I urge you to attend. The



choir will be accompanied by guest musicians: string quartet, all-female a la Vivaldi, as well as oboe and guest organist. We will fill the chancel with glorious sounds of "Glory to God in the Highest, and peace to God's people on earth." This service will be an excellent way to prepare your hearts and minds for the coming Christmas season.

P.s. On Sunday, December 19, the very-talented Govans Bell Choir will present several Christmas selections. One will include the lovely flute playing of our own Myra Brosius, in "Celtic Noel." Christmas Eve (8:00 pm) will be a Lessons and Carols service with many beautiful arrangements of our favorite Christmas favorites. "O come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord."
