Black History Month was created by Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Realizing the need to focus the attention of the public on the vast contributions of its African American citizens, in 1926, Dr. Woodson organized "Negro History Week" which was expanded with



Lincoln and Frederick Douglass were born during the month. Since 1976. every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world. including Canada and the

United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history."



Letter from Pastor Billy

Hello, Govans,

How do we define the church today? And what counts as "church" in the digital and COVID era? Last month, as part of my work toward my Doctor of Ministry degree, I took a course on contemporary ecclesiologies (the study of the church) devoted to those questions.



The course made use of some wonderful books to broaden our discussion of the many ways the Christian church is growing and adapting in the world, such as Song-Chan Rah's moving Evangelical perspective on anti-racism work and the future of the church in <u>The Next Evangelicalism</u>: Freeing the Church from Western Cultural <u>Captivity</u>. As a class, we also tackled Jurgen Moltmann's classic <u>The Church in the Power of the Spirit</u> in which the well-known "theologian of

hope" offers his vision of the church as a diverse community gathered, empowered, and sent by God's Spirit to transform the world. Although Moltmann describes his context 50 years ago, I was struck by the similarities to our own current struggles as a faith. He writes:

In this situation of paralysing apathy and the creeping recession of the will to live, the Christian faith must show itself in courage for incarnation, in a passionate love of life, and in its ardent interest in existence, so that the feeble 'enjoyment' of life acquires the power to resist death, catastrophe and all the people who pursue them.

I am so grateful to serve a church like Govans that embodies that "courage for incarnation" and I hope that in the month ahead you might challenge yourself to live into Moltmann's threefold calling of courage, passion, and "ardent interest in existence" through your personal spiritual life and through your support of our collective mission and ministry at Govans.





is American history and should not be confined to 28/29 days of the year. There is so much to be learned (and unlearned).


Usually, when students learn about Black history in class, their lessons are limited to slavery or the civil rights era. Don't get me wrong: these are integral parts of our story, and it's encouraging to read stories that show our strength, perseverance, and ability to overcome so many adversities. I am proud to come from a culture filled with people who were bold and brave enough to fight for our freedom and rights. But in the same breath, I can't help but feel disappointed that our students are not learning about the vastness of our greatness. After all, we are much more than just an oppressed culture. As we continue to fight the forces that want to sanitize and edit the aggregate of African Americans' experiences and contributions, we embrace the continued relevance of Black History Month and the absolute necessity that this history be taught and celebrated throughout the year.


LENTEN STUDY OF JESUS AND THE DISINHERITED

result of this time. It has also been a way to check in with my own faith in relation to Scripture. While Scripture stays the same over time, our faith grows and matures. Therefore we never read the same Bible twice (deep, right?).

The Season of Lent (beginning March 2 with Ash Wednesday) is a time when Christians are invited to give special attention to their spiritual life. In pop culture this often translates into people "giving up" something for Lent. Chocolate, alcohol, and soft drinks are popular abstentions. Giving something up can certainly be meaningful. It reminds us of the ways we can become dependent on things instead of dependent on God. However, I would encourage you to instead (or also) consider adding a devotional practice to your life. A regular time of prayer each morning. A regular meditative walk at lunch. Reading the Bible or a devotional book. Committing to calling a friend or family member once a day to check in. Slowly, mindfully eating one meal a day. The list of possibilities could go on and on.

In this newsletter, you will find two possibilities for added devotional practice in Lent. Pastor Billy is leading a study of The Little Prince in conversation with the Gospel of John. You can participate in that study in French or English or both. Minister Lea and I are leading a study of Jesus and the Disinherited, by Howard Thurman who was a mentor of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Both opportunities offer meaningful ways to deepen your spiritual life during this season that happens to coincide with the coming of Spring and the new life celebrated in Easter.

Regardless of what you choose to do or not do (or abstain from doing), I invite you to be intentional about your spiritual growth in the coming year. We have been given the gift of life. Let's be thoughtful and prayerful in how we live it.

The Session met for our regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, January 18. Here are some highlights from the meeting.

We approved the 2022 Operating Budget. This budget will be shared with the congregation before the March 6th Annual Congregational Meeting. Some highlights of the budget include:


- A strong increase in pledging with 8 new pledges and over \$50,000 in increased pledges.
- Increased pledge support for the staffing initiative
- Increased costs from the Presbytery recommended 4% Cost of Living Increase for all staff and new staff costs needed for operating our new AV equipment.
- We will also be adding a paid singer for the band. This will encourage more singers to participate in the band in the same way section leaders encourage participation in the choir.

We also discussed a vision for a community garden on the front lawn of the church. The proposal came from the Earth Care Committee. The vision would be for Govans to partner with community members to create this garden. We cannot and should not do it alone. Several organizational models are being considered and we will begin to look for partners. At this point the Session communicated to the Earth Care Committee that we support the vision and encouraged them to continue exploring the possibilities. The Session also agreed to a proposal from the Earth Care Committee to sign a letter from the Maryland Campaign for Human Rights in support of a voter referendum for a State Amendment for Environmental Human Rights. Stay tuned for more information as the legislation is considered by this year's General Assembly.

We also heard a report from Facilities about the Preschool Window Wall project. Architects are being interviewed and we are working closely with our Owner Representative. The safety of the children of the Preschool will be our highest priority moving forward with this project.

Finally, we approved an updated COVID Policy. The full policy was included in the weekly email and can be found on the church website. Significant changes to the policy include an emphasis on high quality masks like KN95 for staff and worshippers. The new policy also emphasizes we will follow CDC, state and city guidelines and mandates as we seek to navigate the ever changing nature of the pandemic.

FEBRUARY MISSION OFFERING - GEDCO AND CARES:

Govans Presbyterian Church was one of the leading churches that started GEDCO and the CARES program to meet the needs of our neighbors. CARES was opened in 1993 by a group of devoted volunteers primarily from churches in the Govans neighborhood of north Baltimore. Their vision was to create a centralized place where area churches could send persons in need and know they would be served more effectively and efficiently. We continue to support GEDCO and CARES through our offering and continued food donations.

GEDCO's CARES serves families and individuals in crisis by connecting our clients with resources that enable movement towards self-sufficiency. These resources include food and emergency financial assistance services.

CARES continues to be run by an extremely dedicated team, consisting of one full time and one part time employee, as well as over 100 volunteers. With the generous support and food donations made by GEDCO's network of over 55 Member Organizations, individuals, schools, corporations, government agencies, and community groups, GEDCO's CARES responded to over 3,599 requests for food and financial assistance to over 478 families. This included providing 208 families with eviction prevention assistance, assisting 81 older adults with prescription assistance, and helped 189 households avoid a disruption in their utility service in FY 20 (April 1, 2019 thru March 31, 2020).

All donations marked "Mission Offering" during February will be donated to GEDCO/CARES.
