Dear Friends,

Golden Ragwort. I'm in love with Golden Ragwort (aka packera aurea). It didn't happen all at once. It wasn't love at first sight. It is a love that has grown over the years as the ragwort has spread around the flowerbeds in my front yard. I first bought some from Herring Run Nursery many years ago hoping to find something that would grow well in a bed against the east facing porch of our home; lots of shade with just a few hours of morning sun. Well it grew beautifully and immediately sent up those tall, straight



stalked, brilliant simple yellow flowers; like the flowers a child draws when they want to draw a flower.

MUSIC NOTES FROM DEBBY LEWIS:

The Govans Chancel Choir and the Handbell Choir are planning some very special music for **Palm Sunday, April 10 at 11:00 am.** We will meet outside the sanctuary to hear the processional gospel, after which the bells will lead us into the church with joyous ringing and singing.

The mid-week services of Holy Week will be combined services with band and choir together at 7:00 pm. Maundy Thursday will center on the first Communion meal and Jesus' new commandment to "love one another." The Good Friday service will recount the brutal story of Jesus' betrayal, trial, and crucifixion in both scripture and song. Myra Brosius will add her beautiful flute playing to the service, and we will conclude with the sung "Solemn Reproaches" as the altar is stripped. The evening ends in silence and shadows.

On April 17, the Festival of the Resurrection will resound with shouts of "Alleluia! He is Risen indeed!." The choir with trumpet will joyously sing the good news! I would encourage each of you to follow the journey from the garden to the cross and the empty tomb. The messages of these services form the core center of our faith.

Easter will conclude my Interim music ministry at Govans Presbyterian. I have immensely enjoyed this "extra chapter" in my professional life. I would like to thank the choirs, pastors, and staff for the support which has been extended to me. I am blessed and uplifted by this congregation!

LETTER FROM PASTOR BILLY

Hello, Govans,

Each year, I cherish the communal commemoration of Jesus' death and resurrection during Holy Week. I love gathering not just to tell Jesus' story, but to reenact the story in our own bodies and look for our place among the characters and circumstances. In each annual retelling, I find a new perspective and appreciation for the ways that we continue to crucify God's



messengers and children today, as well as God's continual offering of new life to us all through resurrection and rebirth. I am especially excited for our community Easter Egg Hunt at 10:10 am on Easter Sunday morning (April 17)!

This season, I am also preparing for another course as part of my Doctor of Ministry program at Wesley Theological Seminary. My class this summer explores Biblical models and images of leadership, from the early judges and kings of Israel to Jesus' ministry and the example of his earliest disciples.





plant spreading around the bed little by little. Each year, there would be a few more a little further from the mother plant. Also they are basically evergreen which is as much a wonder as the flowers. How do those tender looking leaves endure freezing temperatures with just a mild wilt before coming back strong?

Last year, one plant self seeded and popped up across the yard in a sunnier spot. I was worried about it. It seemed to struggle without the shade of the house, but I decided to let nature take its course. This year, despite whatever struggle it seemed to have, it has decided to spread there too. The final part of this ode to rawort involves how easy it is to divide. In the fall, I pulled as many as 30 little shoots and spread them around another bed under the Red bud trees. Lots of shade there. This spring those little babies are growing and sending up their stalks for a showy display in just a month or so.

I suppose I should bring this around to some Easter metaphor. Or some metaphor about resilience or growth. But, perhaps you can make those connections for yourselves. That's one of the amazing things about spring. We can't walk out our door without having the metaphors of life and love and beauty wash over us and course through us. So maybe the message is just this: Fall in love with the wonder of nature. With specific plants. With special places. With all of creation. Based on the joy creation stirs within us, it certainly seems it has chosen to be in love with us.

PRESBYTERIANS PREPARE FOR A HYBRID GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Presbyterians from across the United States are preparing to gather online and in-person in Louisville, Kentucky for the 225th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) this summer. The General Assembly meets every two years to make decisions regarding the ministry and mission of our national denomination. The Assembly is the highest "council" in our Presbyterian form of governance; the other councils of our church (in descending order) are synods, presbyteries, and sessions.

Govans' Associate Pastor, Rev. Billy Kluttz, will attend the assembly as a voting commissioner and member of the Environmental Justice Committee, representing the Presbytery of Baltimore. In total, the Presbytery of Baltimore will send five ruling elder and teaching elder delegates: Keith Reagan, Audrey Trapp, Barbara Renton, Gayelle Sama, and Pastor Billy. The General Assembly will meet from June 18 to July 9, 2022. Pastor Billy will be in Louisville only during the Environmental Justice Committee meetings (June 22-26) and will participate remotely for the rest of the gathering. This



year, the environmental justice committee will consider issues such as divesting Presbyterian funds from companies causing climate change, establishing a denominational tree fund, and reviewing our denomination's lobbying efforts on behalf of environmental concerns.

You can learn more about the General Assembly's work and watch many of the proceedings online at oga.pcusa.org/section/ga/. We will have additional updates in this newsletter as we near the event.

Testament and Pastoral Care Practices by the incredible scholar duo Denise Dombkowski Hopkins and Michael Koppel. This book explores how pastoral caregivers (and that means all Christians seeking to care for one another) can use stories and images from the Bible to better listen to one another and help make meaning from our individual and shared experiences. In the book, they argue that the tension between the larger patterns of the Biblical story (God's hope, grace, and justice) and the haunting questions of human pain and suffering "[characterize] Israelite faith, and [are] echoed by the Good Friday/Easter dialectic of Christian tradition." However, rather than alleviate that tension or explain away the twin sorrow and hope of Good Friday and Easter, they encourage readers to lean into the dual reality of life and loss, writing: "Some desperately want the sense that Sunday resolves Friday, but 'liturgically, both claims linger'" (p.25).

In this moment of global suffering, war, and pandemic transitions, I hope that you will give yourself the space and permission to feel both "claims" and realities in your life-however they may be presenting themselves. May Holy Week and Eastertide be an invitation both to explore the grief you are

carrying and the joy that makes its home amid the grief. And may both of those experiences bring you love and new life to share.



The Session met for our regular monthly meeting on Monday, March 14. Here are some highlights of our meeting:

- We approved Marie Herrington as our new Second Service Music Director. Marie will start on the Monday after Easter, April 18. (see cover page for more info about Marie.)
- We approved a brief congregational survey that will ask each member to share their thoughts about whether we should have combined services throughout the summer

months or continue with our current schedule of two services with a combined service on the first Sundays. Please stay tuned for the link to that survey.

- We reviewed the process for the Pastors' evaluations which take place every two years in the spring. Please be on the lookout for links that will allow you to affirm the ways you appreciate Rev. Harris and Rev. Kluttz and the ways you would like to see them grow in their ministries.
- We discussed the concerns and questions that were raised in the congregational meeting about reducing the size of the Session. We look forward to more discernment around the issue as we seek the best way to structure our church leadership.
- Finally, we had an in depth discussion about our COVID policy in light of new CDC recommendations and the lifting of the mask mandate in Baltimore City. After much discussion we voted to remove mask mandates for church activities. However, given that many different organizations use our building including the Preschool and the Senior Center, we allowed that any organization or group could keep masks mandates or other restrictions in place for their organization or group. This includes the music teams or any committee or group who may decide as a group to continue to wear masks for their meetings. In addition, all worship services and meetings will continue to be accessible on Zoom. You can read about other details of the new policy in the weekly email. We encourage everyone to respect and support each person's decisions about wearing masks and to carry a mask with you in case a situation arises when wearing a mask would make others more comfortable.

If you have any questions about this policy or anything that was decided by the Session, please speak with me, Pastor Tom, Pastor Billy, or any other member of the Session.
