Dear Friends,

As I write this I'm sitting outside watching the sunset. The temperature is 64 degrees in February. The high today at BWI was 75 degrees which was close to a 148 year old record. Those of us who are deeply concerned about climate change have mixed feelings about such unusual weather. Shouldn't we grieve for the loss of predictable rhythms of seasonal temperature which have sustained local ecosystems and life on earth for 1000's of years? Is it OK to enjoy a February day like this?



Indeed it is hard not to enjoy a 75 degree day, even with that nagging feeling that this is not right. We are not alone as we navigate this moral maze. Younger generations today have been defined by dire and realistic predictions about the end of life as we know it: rising tides, entire

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
SESSION APPROVES RACIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY PUBLIC STATEMENT

The Racial Justice Ministry Working Group drafted a Public Statement outlining the specific ways we are seeking to be an anti-racist church. The statement that follows was approved by the Session at their February 15, 2022 meeting:

In the spirit of Christ, Govans Presbyterian Church strives to be an anti-racist church. We practice the love of Jesus in a relational ministry, and we fight for equality and equal opportunity for all people.

Definitions and assumptions that embody the work of our ministry:

- Racism is a sin, endemic within the United States and the body of the Christian church. It appears in many forms.
- Individual Racism includes both prejudicial acts from a person in power of one race toward another, typically marginalized person of a different race. ¹

LETTER FROM PASTOR BILLY

Hello Govans.

I cannot wait to dive into *The Little Prince* and the Gospel of John with you. Our small group will meet on Saturdays in Lent via Zoom. We will discuss the classic children's book and its connections to John's gospel in English from 3:00 to 4:00 pm and then in French from 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm. You are welcome to join for one or both conversations. You do not need to



purchase the book beforehand, but you are welcome to if you would like to read along from home or between gatherings.

The gospel of John and The Little Prince have lots of interesting parallels and differences. John's gospel doesn't contain parables, whereas The Little Prince can be read as one extended parable. There are also lots of shared symbols and images between these two stories (sheep, especially) and both books offer us a self-sacrificial story devoted to the power and importance of life. My favorite section of The Little Prince is the conversation about taming between the Little Prince and the fox:

[I]f you tame me, it will be as if the sun came to shine on my life. I shall know the sound of a step that will be different from



COMMUNITY KICKBALL RETURNS!








LENTEN STUDY OF JESUS AND THE DISINHERITED

The grain, which is also golden, will bring me back the thought of you. And I shall love to listen to the wind in the wheat.

SESSION APPROVES RACIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY PUBLIC STATEMENT...continued from cover page

- Systemic Racism includes ideologies within systems and organizations of power that result in and support continued unfair advantages to some people and harmful treatment of others based on race.
- Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) is a term recognizing that not all people of color experience the same inequities or injustices in our society. We use this term to emphasize groups most marginalized in our Church.
- **Antiracism** is active engagement in work to oppose individual and systemic racism.
- While individuals can and do perform racist acts, systemic racism is more insidious and dangerous to Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC).
- We recognize that dismantling racism is not, and must not be, primarily the work of people of color. Govans' commitment to being anti-racist is a congregation-wide commitment, with white and BIPOC members collaborating as a team. We recognize that racism in our church and society creates severe disadvantages for non-white people, and that white people benefit from the power differentials created by those very disadvantages. Because of this, we understand that the white members of the congregation have a particular responsibility to vigilantly work to recognize, correct, and if possible, reverse the destructive and sinful effects of racism in our church and the surrounding community.

Why must we become an anti-racist church? We answer this question guided by perspectives of Theological and Presbyterian faith traditions.


- There are three basic tenets of the Christian faith:
 - All people are created in the image of God.
 - Jesus told us to do unto others as we would like them to do unto us; but racism does to others what we would hate done to us.
 - Jesus also said, love our neighbors, but racism inhibits the practice of love in communities
- The sin of racism causes a division between the races and marginalizes a significant portion of our population, resulting in severe and ongoing inequality between the races in education, wealth, health, income and opportunity.
- While individuals can and do perform racist acts, systemic racism is more insidious and dangerous to our society and to the Christian Church.
- According to the Presbyterian Church Anti-racism/Racial Justice Policy Statement: "Our identity [as Christians] compels us to oppose the forces of injustice. Antiracism, therefore, is prescriptive for what a faithful community must do in the quest to let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. The church must actively oppose the forces of racism in concrete and strategic ways." 3
- "We know that all people are sacred and worthy. We are made equal by God, who created humanity in God's own image. Out of our deep love of God and neighbor, when we see people being treated as less than equal we will speak out."
- In 1999, the 211th General Assembly declared that we will "assume an antiracist identity, provide adequate staffing and funding for implementation of the church-wide strategy for antiracism...and urge governing bodies and congregations to assume an antiracism identity, [making] available to the church training resources, which are essential for the implementation of the church-wide strategy." (1999 Statement PCUSA).
- We grieve that these statements and initiatives from our denomination and church have not resulted in


sustained action.

• Therefore, we conclude that now is the time to act rather than analyze and in a spirit of repentance Govans Presbyterian Church seeks to become an antiracist church.

Particular Actions our church is taking to make Govans Presbyterian Church an anti-racist church:

- Showing the level of commitment in a financial and practical way, the Session established Racial Justice as a dedicated ministry of the church and Committee of Session (not simply a program); this ministry is financially supported by hiring a Minister of Racial Justice (January 2021).
- We formed a Racial Justice Ministry Working Group which includes church members as well as members from broader community
- We are educating ourselves and offering opportunities to the congregation and community to join in this education. (Book Groups, Racial Justice Speakers Series)
- We are engaging with the community around racial issues (Storytelling, Movie Nights, Open Space Conversations).
- We are currently forming antiracist policies on hiring, contracting and other employment issues, to become anti-racist and to encourage BIPOC to apply for open positions at any level within our church organization.
- We are in contact with other denominations and other PCUSA congregations that have taken on the difficult, ongoing work of pursuing racial justice to learn from their triumphs and mistakes





• We will be using Adult Options and other church forums to explain the history of Govans' involvement in fighting for (and impeding) civil rights, so we can learn how to proceed, especially within the Presbytery's Matthew 25 initiative.



²Definition of antiracist from *How to Be An Antiracist* by Ibram X. Kendi: "To be antiracist is to think nothing is behaviorally wrong or right – inferior or superior – with any of the racial groups. Whenever the antiracist sees individuals behaving positively or negatively, the antiracist sees exactly that: individuals behaving positively or negatively, not representatives of whole races. To be antiracist is to deracialize behavior, to remove the tattooed stereotype from every racialized body. Behavior is something humans do, not races do."

³From the Presbyterian Church Anti-racism/Racial Justice Policy Statement: "Racism is the opposite of what God intends for humanity. It is the rejection of the other, which is entirely contrary to the Word of God incarnate in Jesus Christ...Racism is the continuing legacy of white supremacy. Racism is a lie about our fellow human beings, for it says that some are less than others. It is also a lie about God, for it falsely claims that God favors parts of creation over the entirety of creation."

The Session met for our monthly meeting on Tuesday, February 15, 2022 and we wanted to share some high-lights from the meeting:

We are excited to announce that we approved a Public Policy Statement on Racial Justice. This was the result of great work by the Racial Justice Ministry Working Group. The statement offers definitions of terms like individual and systemic racism, and anti-racism. It provides a theological foundation for our anti-racist work. And it details the specific actions we will take as an anti-racist church. The full statement is linked in the weekly email and will be in the March edition of the paper newsletter.

We also approved an anti-racist hiring policy which will guide us whenever we search for new staff members at Govans Presbyterian. We have learned that without intentional anti-racist steps taken in a hiring process, unconscious racial biases can influence our decisions far more than we realize.

We approved the 2022 Mission Budget. Thanks to the Mission Committee for preparing this budget. With the help of generous support from the congregation, as well as the Brown Memorial Woodbrook Mission Endowment and other mission endowments we increased our giving to almost all our Mission Partners and added two new Partners. We added The Center which is a youth urban mission camp run by our Presbytery in Baltimore City and Strength to Love, a community based urban farm which addresses food apartheid in the city and trains formerly incarcerated individuals in agriculture and workforce development.

Finally, we made plans for our Annual Congregational Financial Meeting which will be held after our combined service on March 6th. The congregation will be receiving the Annual Financial Report before the meeting thanks to the hard work of Charles Forbes and Pam Wallace. At that same meeting will elect the Elder Nominating Committee. We also will ask you to consider a recommendation from the Session that we reduce the

size of the Session from 12 to nine members over the next few years as a way to free up leaders for other leadership opportunities in the church.

If you have any questions about any of these actions or anything else related to the Session please speak with me, Rev. Harris, Rev. Kluttz or any member of Session.

SPECIAL TREATMENT AVAILABLE FOR CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE GOVANS ENDOWMENT FUND

With many of our members 70½ or older and facing Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) every year, please let me remind you that you can donate directly to our IRS-qualified Endowment Fund (EF) through Oualified Charitable Contributions. This is an excellent way to fulfil your annual pledge to Govans. Further, they can offset part or all of your RMD. This allows you to make a contribution over and above any you might qualify for through your income tax return, and direct contributions are not subject to income taxes, even if you do not itemize your deductions. Finally, the program has been permanently extended and allows for total distributions up to your RMD amount, or \$100,000 per year, whichever is less. Gifts may be made from either traditional IRAs or Roths, but they must be made directly from your custodian to the EF. They cannot go into your account and then on to the Endowment Fund to qualify for this special treatment. Your tax advisor or IRA custodian will want to know that Govans is a 501(c)3 organization under IRS Group Ruling No. 1617.

cities becoming uninhabitable, enormous displacement of populations, water shortages, collapse of food changes, mass extinctions. These predictions were part of the air they breathed as they became adults. They drank the water of apathetic adults and to be fair the majority of these younger generations have not done much more than their parents to address the threat. We all keep playing our violins on this sinking ship.

So far this is about the most mournful of Pastoral Ponderings. However, the message is really not; at least not entirely. Because the answer to the question "Should we enjoy a 75 degree February day that is almost certainly and organically connected to climate change?" is...yes!

Yes we should enjoy it. We enjoy it because our grief and guilt and worry solves nothing. We enjoy it because even though it seems wrong, the mere fact that it exists means there is something right about it; at least if we assume that God is in fact in control of all things. We enjoy it because joy in each moment requires us to cease striving for a happiness wholly dependent on a future ideal.

Does this mean we give up on change? That we decide nothing can be done? All is lost? "Eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow we die"? (1 Corinthians 15:31) No. We must act. We owe action to future generations. We owe action to our children. We must speak, march, and vote. We must change the way we eat and the way we drive. We must advocate for a radical change in public policy – local, state, national – for in the end we can't just drive our way out of this crisis in our electric cars. Only massive public policy change will help. We can't risk being moderate about climate change.

AND, we can breathe in the air on a 75 degree February day and give thanks to God. Give thanks for the warm sun on our skin. Give thanks for being alive. Experience joy. For joy today is essential to any joyful future.







