LETTER FROM PASTOR BILLY

Hello, Govans,

I was overjoyed to see so many of you at our blessing of the backpacks and Sunday school open house last month! Parents, we are still looking for volunteers to help teach Sunday school this fall so please reach out

to me if you are willing to be one of our co-teachers for one Sunday.

This month, we'll begin our next year of the Youth Servant Leader program. Youths from 8th to 12th grade are invited to a year of intentional leadership development through service in the church, community, and regular conversation about what it means to be a Christian leader. This year, we will also be pairing each of the Youth Servant Leaders with an adult in the congregation to learn and work together. If you would be willing to serve as a YSL mentor, please let me know.

The fall makes me think of Joy Harjo's poem "Perhaps the World Ends Here." Her poem focuses on the life of generations, all built around a table. 



ChurchWorks News from the Session

The Session met for our monthly meeting on Tuesday, September 20 and we wanted to share some highlights from that meeting with you.

Our first item of business was a discussion about security on the church campus. We reviewed a new document published by the Department of Homeland Security, "Mitigating Attacks on Houses of Worship." Although these attacks are very rare they can be devastating. As a result of this discussion we decided to gather a small team to evaluate campus security. The team will study the issue and recommend to the Session steps we can take to make our church more secure. Please speak with me, Leslie Grant, or the Pastors if you are interested in helping with this work.

The Facilities Committee with support from the Racial Justice Committee recommended a policy to guide our anti-racist efforts in regard to hiring the contractors who provide services to the church. We approved the policy to be used whenever we are hiring contractors.

We reviewed some initial design concepts from the architect designing the preschool curtain wall and playground renovation. The architect will use input from the Curtain Wall Project Team and the Session to refine the scope of the project and come back to us with more specific design proposals.

From the Govans Urban Farm Visioning Team we received an update on their progress. Their vision is to create a community farm designed to bring the diverse people of the Govans neighborhood together around the common goal of growing organic, sustainable, healthy food. The farm would be located on the empty lot in front of the sanctuary along York Road. The team is exploring models for such a farm including a possible community supported agriculture model. They are planning a neighborhood survey and outreach project to seek community input and identify potential community leaders. They asked the Session to share questions and concerns about the project so they can take these into account as they continue their planning. The Session continues to support the concept and raised critical questions about:

- the aesthetics of the project in such a highly visible location,
- the need for board based community input and participation in the planning,
- funding for the project both short term and funding that is long term and sustainable.





CLEAN WATER PROJECT FOR BUTOKE IN DR CONGO

Dear Friends of Butoke Supporters,

In the rural Kasai area of DR Congo where Butoke operates, only a small number of people have access to safe, clean water. We want to provide you and other long-time supporters with more details about the start of a campaign to raise funds to help Butoke and villagers - **Build Congo Springs**. This is a project to develop protected, clean water sources to improve health outcomes in 15 Kasai villages.



This past spring, Dr. Jean of Butoke realized more ought to be done to ensure rural villagers have greater access to clean water. Two things had happened at that time:

- Urgent repairs were needed at a major Tshikaji spring, the source of clean water for thousands of villagers, including Butoke nutrition and orphan care centers.
- Chiefs in other villages asked Butoke to assess their unprotected village spring's condition, to see if it meets qualifications for development of a new, protected clean water spring.

Soon after, Butoke assessed all major springs in the area: a) protected springs built some 10 or so years ago; and b) other unprotected village springs, each a potential candidate for new development. The results: seven springs need rehabilitation; eight others meet criteria for development. Dr. Jean provided us with full results of the assessments, including details for each village spring source. He also asked for financial assistance for the Tshikaji repair and for the overall springs project. We are grateful that a donor stepped forward to fund stop-gap repairs at Tshikaji.

Yet additional funding is needed to support the entire project. We reviewed the project information, asked questions, consulted many other sources, and made a thorough Analysis and Report for the Board's consideration. Our conclusion is that we strongly support the Build Congo Springs project.

At the same time, we must still do everything we can to ensure we meet basic funding needs for Butoke's ongoing operations. Accordingly, we plan to raise funds for the springs project separate from support for Butoke's ongoing operations.

The Build Congo Springs fundraising campaign has a target of \$56,000. This far exceeds anything we have undertaken in the past.

Candidly, this presents many challenges for us, a small non-profit with an all-volunteer Board, no staff, and with a dedicated and faithful core group of supporters. We also plan to reach out across the country to other individuals and organizations that support clean water projects and other Congo initiatives, and ask them to help in raising the funds that are needed.
