

The Summoning of Black Joy, Dr. Khadijah Z. Ali-Coleman

Khadijah Z. Ali-Coleman, Ed.D. is an award-winning performance artist, multi-genre writer, producing playwright and filmmaker. She is author of the children's book Mariah's Maracas and the 2023 Juneteenth weekend release, The Summoning of Black Joy: a poetry collection. She is co-editor of the 2022 release, Homeschooling Black Children in the US. Dr. Ali-Coleman has been featured in the The Washington Post, USA Today, The Guardian, The Financial Times and more because of her work in arts and education. She has been interviewed by various broadcast media outlets, including NPR, CNN, Slate, and local affiliates of NBC, FOX and CBS recently, specifically because of her work in the Black homeschooling community. She is currently the 2023 Poet Laureate of Prince George's County, MD.

Since COVID-19, how have we pivoted in a world that was already on the verge of losing its mind? Dr. Ali-Coleman joins us for a talk on homeschooling Black children, finding peace through writing, remote work and her new book, The Summoning of Black Joy: a poetry collection.

Benjamin Banneker and Us: Eleven Generations of An American Family by Rachel Jamison Webster


In 1791, Thomas Jefferson hired a Black man to help survey Washington, DC. That man was Benjamin Banneker, an African-American mathematician, a writer of almanacs, and one of the greatest astronomers of his generation. Banneker then wrote what would become a famous letter to Jefferson, imploring the new president to examine his hypocrisy, as someone who claimed to love liberty yet was an enslaver. More than two centuries later, Rachel Jamison Webster, an ostensibly white woman, learns that this groundbreaking Black forefather is also her distant relative.(Amazon review)


Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass by Frederick Douglass

Former slave, impassioned abolitionist, brilliant writer, newspaper editor and eloquent orator whose speeches fired the abolitionist cause, Frederick Douglass (1818–1895) led an astounding life. Physical abuse, deprivation and tragedy plagued his early years, yet through sheer force of character he was able to overcome these obstacles to become a leading spokesman for his people. In this, the first and most frequently read of his three autobiographies, Douglass provides graphic descriptions of his childhood and horrifying experiences as a slave as well as a harrowing record of his dramatic escape to the North and eventual freedom. Published in 1845 to quell doubts about his origins — since few slaves of that period could write — the Narrative is admired today for its extraordinary passion, sensitive and vivid descriptions and storytelling power. It belongs in the library of anyone interested in African-American history and the life of one of the country's most courageous and influential champions of civil rights.
